



THE LIFE AND ADVENTURES OF NICHOLAS NICKLEBY PART 1



Nicholas astonishes Mr Squeers and family

In which the Nickleby family, Nicholas, his sister Kate and their mother, are left penniless upon the death of Mr Nickleby, and journey to London to enlist the assistance of the unpleasant Uncle Ralph Nickleby, a wealthy money-lender and usurer. Upon their arrival in London, they make the acquaintance at their boarding house of Miss La Creevy, a painter of miniature portraits. Nicholas takes employment at Dotheboys Hall, a boarding school for boys in Yorkshire, run by Mr Squeers, his wife, and his son Wackford Squeers. Nicholas also meets daughter Fanny Squeers, her friend Tilda Price, and Tilda's fiancé John Browdie. However, the regime at the school is so brutal, and the treatment of the boys (especially a poor simple-minded boy named Smike, who was abandoned there many years earlier by a man called Brooker), disgusts Nicholas so much that he strikes Mr Squeers and returns to London, followed by Smike, who becomes his loyal companion.

Meanwhile, Kate has obtained employment in London's West End, at a milliner's shop run by Madame Mantalini, whose husband is an inveterate wastrel. On his return to London, Nicholas goes seeking Newman Noggs who, although clerk to Ralph Nickleby, has declared loyalty to Nicholas. He finds Newman at a party at the Kenwigs' house, where he also meets their uncle Mr Lillyvick, and the actress Miss Petowker. While at the Kenwigs', Nicholas rescues their baby just in time from being accidentally burned alive and thus incurs their undying gratitude. He goes looking for another job with politician Sir Matthew Pupker, but decides he does not want to work for him. Meanwhile, Fanny Squeers has written to Ralph Nickleby, informing him of Nicholas's "monstrous behaviour" towards her father. Ralph therefore disinherits Nicholas, who resolves to seek his fortune at sea, and sets out with Smike for Portsmouth.

THE LIFE AND ADVENTURES OF NICHOLAS NICKLEBY

Part II

In which Nicholas and Smike, on their way to Portsmouth, meet Mr Vincent Crummles, a theatre manager, and his sons, Master Crummles and Master Percy Crummles. Mr Crummles invites Nicholas to write for his theatre company, and presently they find themselves touring with the company and its various members: Mr Bane, Mr Wagstaff, Mr Pailey, Mr Fluggers, Mr Hetherington, Mr Blightey, Miss Bravassa, Miss Belvawney, Miss Gazingi, Mrs Lenville, Mrs Crummles, Mrs Grudden, the Infant Phenomenon, Mr Folair, Mr Lenville, Miss Snevellicci and Miss Ledrook. Meanwhile, in London, the Mantalinis' shop goes bankrupt, and is bought over by one of the milliners, Miss Knagg. As Miss Knagg has previously taken a dislike to Kate Nickleby, Kate finds herself out of a job. In Portsmouth, the theatre company is joined by Miss Petowker, whom Nicholas had met previously at the Kenwigs' party. Mr Lillyvick has also come to Portsmouth, where he and Miss Petowker decide to get married. In London, Kate is dragooned by her uncle, into acting as hostess for him, where she meets Sir Mulberry Hawk, Lord Frederick Verisopht, their hangers-on Mr Pluck and Mr Pyke, the Honourable Mr Snobb, and Colonel Chowser. This results in her attracting the completely unwanted attentions of Sir Mulberry Hawk, which causes her great distress. Kate manages to find employment once more as companion to the delicate Mrs Wititterly, but Sir Mulberry Hawk continues to pester her there to such a degree, that she is dismissed. Newman Noggs is so concerned about this state of affairs, that he contacts Nicholas in Portsmouth, and asks him to return to the aid of his sister.

In which Nicholas arrives once more in London. Upon overhearing Hawk, Verisopht, Pluck and Pike discussing Kate loudly and in public, he demands to know who they are. Hawk refuses to identify himself, and strikes Nicholas with a horsewhip, forcing Nicholas to defend himself. For this, Hawk, against the advice of Lord Verisopht, swears vengeance upon Nicholas. Nicholas heads once more for the Employment Exchange, where by chance he meets Mr Charles Cheeryble, who offers him a job. Meanwhile, Mr Squeers and Wackford come to see Ralph Nickleby, requesting compensation for the loss of Smike, and this gives Ralph the idea of retaliating at Nicholas, by harming his friend. The Squeers happen to find Smike wandering the streets of London, seize him, and hold him captive in the house of Mr Snawley, the stepfather of two boys at Dotheboys Hall, and who shares in Squeers' various shenanigans. Ralph Nickleby encounters the man Brooker, who was responsible (although Ralph does not know it) for leaving Smike at Dotheboys Hall many years before. Brooker used to work for Ralph, and attempts to blackmail him with knowledge he claims to have about Ralph, but Ralph is not interested.

Meanwhile, Fanny Squeers has also come to London to attend the marriage of her friend Tilda to John Browdie. John Browdie has never liked Mr Squeers, and when he finds out that Smike is being held against his will, he goes and sets him free. Smike is found by Newman Noggs in another part of London, and returned to the Nicklebys. At the firm of the Brothers Cheeryble, Nicholas has seen, and fallen instantly in love with, Miss Madeline Bray. Miss Bray's father is in debtors' prison, being heavily in debt to Ralph Nickleby, and also to a Mr Gride. Madeline is therefore destitute, but still refuses to abandon her father. Mr Gride has (mysteriously) come into possession of a document unknown to Madeline, which says that she is due to inherit a fortune. It is therefore his intention to force Madeline to marry him, thereby cancelling her father's debts, both to himself and Ralph Nickleby, and Ralph colludes with him in this devious plan.

The Brothers Cheeryble, however, have known Madeline for many years, and decide to help her out. Nicholas is sent to her on the pretext of commissioning her little drawings and ornamental work, on a regular basis and at a slightly inflated price, thus trying to alleviate her financial problems. Later, at the Nicklebys' house, Ralph and Squeers arrive with Snawley, with a fictitious document claiming that Smike is Snawley's son, and try to take him away. However, John Browdie prevents this. Meanwhile, Arthur Gride is being assisted in his wedding preparations by his housekeeper. Peg Sliderskew, who had hoped to marry him herself, and is therefore less than pleased by this turn of events. Newman Noggs, visiting Gride, learns accidentally of Madeline's inheritance, and informs Nicholas of this. Nicholas then tries to persuade Madeline that it is unnecessary for her to marry Gride, but she refuses to believe him.

At a gambling house in another part of London, Lord Frederick Verisophi tries to persuade Sir Mulberry Hawk not seek vengeance on Nicholas for his assault. Hawk takes offence and demands satisfaction by a duel, in which Verisophi is killed. Hawk then hurries to Ralph Nickleby's house, where the wedding of Madeline to Gride is in progress, but has already been interrupted by Nicholas, trying to prevent it. Hawk informs Ralph that Verisopht has died, owing Ralph £10,000, and that Ralph is therefore financially ruined. While this is happening, Madeline's father dies, thus absolving her of her obligation to Gride, and to Ralph Nickleby, who has now lost even more money. Gride also realises that Peg Sliderskew has taken the deed confirming Madeline's inheritance, and that soon Madeline will know the truth. Ralph resolves to find Peg before anyone else, so that he can destroy the deed, and prevent Nicholas, who wants to marry Madeline, from coming into her fortune.

Nicholas and Kate take Smike, who has now been ill for some time, to their native village in Devon, to recuperate. In London, Mr Squeers comes to see Ralph, who sends him to try to get the deed from Peg Sliderskew. Squeers tricks her out of the deed, but is prevented from getting away by Frank Cheeryble and Newman Noggs, who recover the deed, and by a policeman, who throws Squeers in jail. At Dotheboys Hall, the knowledge of Squeers' imprisonment, causes the boys to rise up against the rest of his family, and run away; while in London, Ralph is summoned to the office of the Brothers Cheeryble, where he makes a discovery which is to have far-reaching repercussions on the lives of everyone......


