The Theatre at Ace Hotel [1927]


n 1919, director D. W. Griffith and stars Mary Pickford, Douglas Fairbanks, and Charlie Chaplin broke from the studio system to form United Artists (UA), thus gaining complete control over their work. This was UA's flagship theatre on the West Coast.

The theatre was designed by C. Howard Crane, known primarily for his work in the Midwest. The theatre lobby is seamlessly integrated into a thirteenstory office building designed by Walker

and Eisen.

The building's elegant terra cotta and cast stone ornamentation is inspired by Gothic architecture, yet it has a symmetry and verticality typical of early Art Deco styling. A tower of pressed metal rises an additional fifty feet above the top floor.

The 1,600-seat auditorium has the appearance of a grotto, with fan-shaped ceiling brackets highly ornamented in the Spanish Gothic manner. The ceiling has an oval dome at its center tiled with mirrors and originally hung with thousands of crystal drops.



The side walls feature murals depicting UA's founders along with other great stars of the era. Handsome nudes on one mural are alleged to be the UA Board of Directors; demons on the other side are

caricatures of evil studio bosses. The murals are by José Rivas through the Heinsbergen Decorating Company.

From the late 1980s to 2011, the theatre served as the University Cathedral Church of Dr. Gene Scott. In 2012 the building was converted into a boutique hotel, with the theatre restored as an event and performance space.
