The Grave Of Every Hope is part of the Royal Shakespeare Company's Antigones

Project. The Project has been made possible because the RSC's Education Department is the recipient of the major 1991 Sainsbury's Award for Arts Education of £100,000.

Using the story of **Antigone**, Sophocles' Greek tragedy, as a stimulus, groups of young people in six different regions of the country are working with professional writers and directors to create their own new plays. The project is taking place in a number of culturally and environmentally diverse areas of the UK: Cheshire, Comwall, Country Durham, London, Scotland and Solihull in the West Midlands.

On the 21st and 22nd November 1992, the **Antigones Project** will culminate in a weekend festival of young people's original creative work, when all six plays will be presented at The Other Place, the RSC's new studio theatre in Stratford-upon-Avon.

The Sainsbury Awards are designed to recognise and encourage new educational activities in the arts. The winners were chosen because they best succeeded in widening young peoplexperience, understanding and interest in the arts, either as participants or as members of an audience. The Sainsbury's arts sponsorship programme also includes the Sainsbury's Choir of the Year Competition, and support for the annual Contemporary Art Society's "Art Market" at Smith's Galleries, Covent Garden.

## **DIRECTOR'S NOTE:**

Scottish Youth Theatre's XSYT Productions Company is delighted to have been invited to participate in this prestigious project. Working alongside playwright Lara Jane Bunting, the group was asked to use Sophocles' Antigone as a stimulus to explore contemporary dramatic language. The group was then required to create their own new play based on these explorations.

In May '92 an XSYT Company of 30 young people, actors and stage managers, came together for a period of intense workshops. These sessions looked at Sophocles' play and at Timberlake Wertenbaker's new translation; explored the nature of Greek drama, especially the place of the chorus; noted the value masks, physical theatre and music might be to the piece. The workshops were led by the creative team: Mary McCluskey (Director), Ralph Haggerty (Musical Director), Steve Small (Asst Director), Graham Hunter (Design Consultant) and Lara Jane Bunting (Playwright).

A decision was made early on in the process to concentrate on drawing parallels between G mythology and our own, Celtic mythology. The group became excited by this and much research was carried out investigating the place of the gods, fate and destiny in pre-Christian Celtic society. These workshop sessions and recent rehearsals have produced many magical moments that we can't hope to re-create. However the shared experience inspired the company to develop the play you will see tonight.
