AWELCOME!

Thank you for coming to see our fourth 1993 Festival Fringe production - Mame.

Mame is our ninth Fringe production, at our fifth Festival Fringe. Some of you may have seen one or more of our three productions in the first week of this year's Fringe: Young at Heart, The Pirates of Pensance and Hard to Swallow. The Fringe company of well over 160 people have enjoyed the thrills of not only working on one or more of these shows, but also the Fringe events such as the Festival Cavalcade and Fringe Sunday.

Mame is the pinnacle of our 1993 Fringe season and we have had to work hard to get the show up and running in time - time has been tight, what with Quinquereme Production's large show requiring a long time to get the set and lights, etc. out of the theatre. Full credit goes to our large, skilled technical team for helping make this transition so smooth.

The story of Mame is a relatively simple one: Patrick Dennis, a small ten year old boy, has been orphaned. His father's will states that Patrick is to be sent with his nanny, Agnes, to live with Mame Dennis, Patrick's aunt and only living relative (St. Bridget). Mame is the extrovert rebel in the family; in two weeks she has thirteen cocktail parties - something which is described as "a quiet week" (It's today!). Her lifestyle slowly rubs off on Patrick, and he takes a great likin to her (Open a new window). Babcock of the Kniekerbocker Bank, appointed to see that the conditions of Patrick's father's will are satisfied, demands Patrick is sent to boarding school to study (My best girl). Meantime, Mame tries many jobs, including acting (The Moon song), and ends up working in a salon for men, where she meets her husband-to-be, Beau. Beau escorts Mame to meet his family in Peckerwood and to propose to her (The Fox Hunt and Mame) and the curtain falls on Act One. Act Two opens ten years after Act One (hopefully our interval will be slighty shorter than this!) with Patrick finishing boarding school (Opening and My best girl) and Mame and Beau nearly finishing their decade-

long honeymoon. Beau is then trapped in an avalanche in the Alps and dies. Mame is full of grief and her life-long friend, Vera, comes to her rescue (Bosom buddies). Mame and Vera persuade Agnes to become more like them and "live a little", which she does, and then comes back pregnant! (Gooch's song). Patrick meets a girl, and invites Mame to meet her (That's how young I feel). Mame doesn't like the new family and embarasses Patrick, who storms out (If he walked into my life). Patrick then falls in love with Mame's lady servant, Pegeen, and marries her (It's today! and My best girl). Patrick and Pegeen have a child called Peter, and leave him with Mame whilst they go on their honeymoon, giving I ame a chance to bring up a second child, having learnt from bringing up Patrick (Finale).

I hope you enjoy watching our production of Mame as much as we have all enjoyed working on it.

THE EDINBURGH YOUNG THEATRE COMPANY

THE PRODUCTION TEAM

DIRECTOR & IAN DEWAR PRODUCER

Ian has been involved, in some way or another, with theatre all his life. He started his theatrical 'career' when he became involved with Community Drama workshops, both performing onstage and directing. Soon after, Ian joined the Edinburgh Scout and Guide Gang Show to perform onstage. He still has an active part to play in the Gang Show, nearing thirty years after he joined! From sole performing, Ian has turned his hand to Front of House, Box Office and Publicity. Ian worked Front of House for the National Youth Music Theatre several years ago, and so has built up a large knowledge on most aspects of theatre. Keen to learn more about the more technical aspects, Ian has attended several lighting and stage management courses as well as operating followspot, lighting and sound, although not even he can manage all of this at once! When he started the Edinburgh Young Theatre Company in April 1989, he could not have predicted that less than five years later he would have one of the strongest youth theatre companies in Edinburgh. All his theatrical 'escapades' are done out of office hours, because Ian is a Company Accountant and Business Consultant by profession.

ROBERT J. HOWDEN DIRECTOR

Robert began his 'career' in musicals back in the sixties with Melrose Operation The Gondoliers. After moving north to Elgin in 1973, he began conducting, stepping in for an indisposed Musical Director. Thereafter he conducted Elgin Operatic for eight seasons and MD'd everything from operetta to musicals and Gilbert and Sullivan. After moving to Edinburgh in 1988, John worked freelance for various societies. His first show in Edinburgh, was The Biograph Girl. This was a Scottish

premiere and was given in the presence of the composer of the piece, David Henekar. This began an association with David Henekar as John recently conducted the Scottish premiere of Henekar's Phil the Fluter at the King's theatre Glasgow. He also conducted, in Mr Henekar's presence, his most popular show, Half a Sixpence, again in the King's, Glasgow. For the last three years John has been acting as an assistant Musical Director at the N.O.D.A. summer schools held in Ripon, Most recently he conducted a section of Benjamin Britten's opera Peter Grimes. As well as working in Edinburgh and Glasgow, John has worked in Kirkcaldy and more recently in Selkirk. In the near future John is back in Glasgow conducting Meet Me in St. Louis and then South Pacific for Selkirk Operatic, and repeats the latter show in the King's Theatre Edinburgh for the Bohemian Lyric Company. John's association with us began last year when he conducted Annie at last year's Festival Fringe.

KATE GALLOWAY MANAGER

Kate has been a member of EYTC for almost four years. She has been the Resident Stage Manager with them ever since it was discovered that she could not act, sing, or dance! She has been a member of the Edinburgh Scout & Guides Gang Show for three years and is the Stage Manager for Firrhill High School, where she is doing the Staff and Sixth Year Pantomime later this year. Kate plays the trumpet (and some times the bugle!) and toured Germany last year, and will be touring Holland next year, with her school Concert and Jazz bands. She is a young leader with the Guides and helps to teach disabled children at Graysmill School. She hopes to do a degree in Computing at University and then to become a Special Needs teacher. Kate likes going to Star Trek conventions, collecting watches and brightearringsandlisteningtoSondheimMusicals.Occasionally_she has been known to set fire to the stage!!

MITHE PRODUCTION TEAM &

MICHAEL HUME DESIGNER

Michael is one of the few remaining founder members of EYTC. He lit and stage-managed EYTC's first show, Our Day Out, and has lit every show to date. Michael has not just just restricted himself to EYTC, though. He has worked with many of the amateur theatre companies in Edinburgh, including Tempo Musical Productions, Quinquereme Productions, the Edinburgh Gilbert & Sullivan Society (in the King's Theatre) and numerous [Schools. Michael has also lit productions for Scottish Youth Theatre, including one which was short-listed for production in London's National Theatre, and another which was taken to the Royal Shakespeare Company in Stratford-upon-Avon, part of the Antigones Festival in November 1992. At this year's Fringe Michael is also working with the National Youth Music Theatre and a new company called Aethelflaed with a production of Murder in the Cathedral. When he leaves school, Michael hopes to study Optoelectronics at University and then to go on to work in the RSC or National Theatre.

BILL HUME DIRECTOR

There are few jobs in theatre to which Bill would be new. His stage management skills are known by many in the Edinburgh amateur theatre circuit, as he has worked with many of the local companies. His main commitment to theatre is with the Edinburgh Gilbert & Sullivan Society, for which he has staged managed the annual production in the King's Theatre for around 20 years. When his son, Michael, became involved with EYTC, Bill volunteered his services in the set department. From then he has provided most of the sets for most of our productions, through the G & S. All this is done is his 'spare' time, as, during office hours, Bill is the Principal Tendering Engineer for Peebles Electric, a subsidiary of Rolls Royce. He is also an active member of his local church. The next production he will be stage managing is Annie get your Gun for the Balerno Community Songsters, in October.

LEN TIMSON DESIGNER

Len became involved with backstage work during his Edinburgh University days. Since then he has become heavily involved with many Edinburgh theatre companies, including Tempo Musical Productions and Quinquereme Productions.

He has taken up many roles, including stage 1management, sound design and technical direction. Len has helped us with many sound systeminstallations on EYTC shows, although this is his first show as our sound designer. Len worked on a production of Mame in America and so is a valuable asset to our production m. In addition to this show, he was involved with producing the programme for Quinquereme Production's Manof La Mancha and designed and operated the sound system for Forth Childrens' Theatre production of The Matchgirls, both at this year's Fringe. He is the Principal Teacher of Computing at Broughton High School, where he helps run the award-winning Film Society.
