Tom Conti made his professional debut at the Citizens Theatre in Glasgow in 1959 in The Roving Boy. In a distinguished career he has since played in many successful productions which include Savages, starring opposite Paul Schofield at the Comedy Theatre, Other people as Enrico Zamati at the Hampstead Theatre. He again returned to Hampstead in Don Juan in the title role, which then transferred to he Aldwych Theatre where he also played Dick Dudgeon in Shaw's The Devil's Disciple for the RSC. He starred in Whose Life Is It Anyway as Ken Harrison, first at the Savoy Theatre, London, for which he was awarded the Variety Club Award and the SWET award (now the Olivier) and then in New York where he won the Tony Award for Best Actor. Later theatre work has included They're Playing or Song with Gemma Craven and Two Into One both at the Shaftesbury Theatre, Romandic Comedy with Pauline Collins and the title role in Jeffrey Bernard is Unwell both at the Apollo Theatre. He starred in the Arthur Miller play The Ride Down Mount Morgan at the Wyndham's Theatre and in 1993 he directed and played in Noel Coward's Present Laughter at the Globe Theatre. In 1996 he and Sharon Gless starred together at the Gielgud Theatre in Chapter Two.

Director credits include Before The Party starring Jane Asher and Michael Gough, The Housekeeper starring Leo Mckern and Last Licks in New York.

Television work includes Mother of Men (BBC), The Confession Game (BBC), The Borderers (BBC), The Doctors (BBC), Castro (Granada), Lex Aguin (BBC), Welcome Christmas (BBC), Thirty Minute Theatre: Castro (BBC), Family At War (Granada), Adam Smith (Granada), Current Account (BBC), Sam (Granada), Fall of Eagles(BBC), If It's A Man, Hang Up (ATV), Churchill's People (BBC), The Gättering Prizes (BBC), Charles Bovary in Madame Bovary (BBC), Play For Today: Early Struggles (BBC), The Rather Reussuring Programme (ATV), Patrick in Christopher Hampton's Treats (Yorkshire Television), Alan Ayckbourn's The Norman Conquests as Norman (Thames), The Beaux Stratagem (BBC), Something's Wrong (BBC), Blade On The Feather by Dennis Potter (Granada), The Beate Klarsfeld Story with Farrah Fawcett, Harry Goes To Edinb. In (BBC), Fatal Dosage, the television series The Wright Verdicts, in which he stars as Charles Wright a criminal Lawyer, and The Inheritance.

His films include Flame, The Life Of Galileo (EMI), Eclipse (Celandine Productions), Full Circle, The Duellists (Scott Free Enterprises), When The Wind Blows (Classic Film Productions), The Bunker And The Wall (Time-Life Productions CBS), Reuben Reuben (Saltair Productions) which earned him a nomination for an Academy Award, Merry Christmas Mr Lawrence with David Bowie for which he won the New York Critic's Award, American Dreamer, Saving Grace, Heavenly Pursuits, Miracles, Beyond Therapy, The Quick And The Dead, The Dumb Waiter, Two Brothers Running, That Summer of White Roses, Shirley Valentine, The Siege of Venice, Someone Else's America and soon to be released Something To Believe In and Crush Depth.

JOHN DOWIE - WRITER

John Dowie spent many years working as a stand-up comedian in Britain and abroad, on television and radio. In 1990 he changed direction, writing and performing two shows: TAKE THEM TO THE GARDEN (based on the works of cult science fiction writer, Philip K. Dick) and WHY I STOPPED BEING A STAND-UP COMEDIAN.

As a Director, shows include WHALE NATION and FALLING FOR A DOLPHIN by poet/playwright Heathcote William's, MORE JAM TOMORROW, by and with Neil Innes; and THE HANGOVER (Edinburgh festival Perrier Nomination). Lately, he has produced two short of children: DOGMAN (Directed by Victor Spinetti) and POEMS TO READ TO YOUR PARENTS.

He is currently working as a performance poet. He has two children, lives in Brighton, and is still desperately searching for A LOOPHOLE THAT COVERS EVERYTHING

TOM KINNINMONT - DIRECTOR

Ayrshire-born Tom has written, produced and directed radio, theatre and television drama since 1977.

From 1978-1989 he was a Drama Producer with BBC Scotland, where his producing credits include LENT with Harry Andrews, UNEXPLAINED LAUGHTER with Diana Rigg and Elaine Page, THE JUSTICE GAME with Denis Lawson, THE STORY OF A RECLUSE, with Stewart Granger, and A VIEW OF HARRY CLARK with Griff Rhys Jones. He left the BBC and moved to London in 1990 to make the feature film HOSTAGE, with Sam Neill and Innex Fox.

His writing credits include four stage plays and a number of screenplays, the most recent of which, BLIND WITNESS was filmed in Germany last year.

Last year Torn produced Ian Pattison's comedy-drama series BAD BOYS, for BBC1, and directed AN AUDIENCE WITH CHARLES DICKENS, five half hour performances starring Simon Callow, for BBC2. His sequel to this, A CHRISTMAS DICKENS can be seen on BBC2 this Christmas beginning on Sunday December 21st.

Currently he is working with Tom Conti to produce a feature film version of PRESENT LAUGHTER, by Noel Coward.
